#### **PASTOR TINA'S TIDBITS**



How truly blessed we are when we wake up to the sun rising in the east and the

sound of birds chirping. How blessed when we watch the sun set in the west to the moon's rising. I will be honest, when Herb and I moved to Tyrone, I wasn't sure what to expect in our new environment. I had never lived "in town" before. I grew up in a little town called West Decatur, got married and moved to Houtzdale and then moved to Morrisdale. Even though I only lived in 3 towns, I moved 9 times before I moved to Tyrone. Each place I lived was on a dead end or a back road with little traffic. What was it going to be like living on one of the busiest streets (or so I was told) in Tyrone? In my short time here, I have seen the hand of God and his beauty at 1203 Clay Ave. I have seen it in the beauty of the flowers in the front of the house. I am not a flower person. I think they are beautiful, but I know the names of about 3 flowers. However, when I went to see the parsonage for the first time, there were purple flowers growing in front of the house. When we moved in, those purple flowers were gone and there were yellow flowers. Soon light orange flowers appeared; then these beautiful burgundy ones and black eyed susans. It amazes me how God provides us with such beauty and color through a simple flower. It reminds me that we can look at someone and in our minds think of them as a simple person, but when we look at them through the eyes of Jesus, we see them as someone of beauty, someone with a purpose. Maybe they can't see that beauty in themselves, maybe they have yet to discover that purpose, but as a child of God, I pray that we are to help them see who they are in Christ Jesus. I have seen the beauty of "love thy neighbor" in both the beautiful gift baskets presented to Herb and I by our new church family and by those who live near us as they have welcomed us to the neighborhood and have already invited to take us for a ride to Sinking Valley to show us where to get all the good produce available; food that is produced by the hard work of the sowing and reaping of others. Though the thing that has amazed me the most from God's hand is almost every night I sit on the front porch and watch the hundreds of fireflies in our front yard. We have always lived in what would be considered the country and I have never seen that number of fireflies anywhere I lived. I remember as a child catching fireflies and putting them in a jar. I have shared that with my children and my grandchildren.

It was a privilege I thought we had because of where we lived. God has shown me in my short time here, His beauty is everywhere if we take the time to stop and look. Too often we are so busy that we fail to stop and see the beauty of nature, of people, even our own beauty. There is a wonderful hymn that reminds us of God's beauty "For the Beauty of the Earth", and the chorus says "Lord of all, to thee we raise this our hymn of grateful praise." May we always look for the beauty surrounding us and give the Lord praise for it all. I praise Him for placing me here with such beautiful people. May He bless us richly in our time together as we look for the beauty in those who are not yet here.

#### **COMMITTEE REPORTS**

Staff Parish Relations Committee: Our prayers are with our custodian, Judy Rodgers, as she recovers her health and builds up her strength. In the meantime, we are asking for volunteers to help with her housekeeping chores. Luckily, it's summer so we can get by with minimal maintenance until mid-September when Sunday school begins again. Weekly help is needed with vacuuming, dusting and keeping restrooms clean and tidy. Please see the sign-up sheet on the sanctuary table for available weeks and chores. If we pitch in, we can keep the church looking great for Judy when she returns! With thanks -Staff Parish Relations Committee.

**Finance Committee:** Randy Miles, Chair gave the following report. Total income received isn't going to meet the total expenses for the first six months of 2018 or our July expenses. Randy and our Endowment Committee Chair, Wayne Hall, provided a solution to the shortage of cash flow that we are experiencing. At their recommendation

and with the approval of the Administrative Council Committee, we are moving \$6000.00 from the Burley Endowment Fund into the General Funds account in order to cover expenditures through the end of August. We are hoping that weekly tithing over the coming weeks will cover the deficit. Additional upcoming expenses include the removal of a dead maple tree at the parsonage and repairs to the leaky boiler in the church/SS building (see Trustees report).

<u>Trustee Committee</u>: David Hess, Chair, reported the church parking lot and the parsonage driveway have been repaired and sealed. Funds for this project came from the "Trustees Wish List Fund". Boiler repairs will be made by D.C. Goodman. Cost is unknown at this time, but the boiler leak must be fixed before the heat is turned on again. A dead maple tree at the parsonage will be removed by Travis Shauf (Tree Service), at a cost of \$900.00. A new mower will be purchased at an estimated cost of \$250.00-\$300.00; both of

these expenses were approved by Council. David is also investigating the cost of having outdoor entrance signs placed at the main entrance to the church and the office. Carpeting for the front portion of the church office and entries to the parking lot and chairlift will be installed. The cost is being covered by a generous benefactor. We are most grateful for these gifts.

Endowment Committee: Chair Wayne Hall reported that he contacted Karen Corrado-Knote, representative from Stifel, regarding our current endowment funds. In discussing our Investment Policy Statement, Karen informed Wayne that we need to revamp our goals for investment performance. A meeting with the committee will be held the first week of August and a meeting with Karen will be held mid to late August.

<u>Pastor's Report</u>: Pastor Tina thanked everyone for the warm welcome she and Herb have received from Wesley. She shared the contents of a letter that will be sent to all members.

She discussed our locked-door policy and suggested that we may want to try leaving it open on Sunday morning. A locked door is not an inviting door. No official decision was made, but the worship committee will look into the suggestion that at least one usher stay by the main entrance door if we decide to leave it open. We will lock the other doors after the service starts.

Pastor Tina is hoping to start a "Story Time on the Lawn" with the neighborhood children on Wednesdays from 10:00 am-10:30 am.

Saturday night services were discussed. We shared that attendance was low and at this time there is no one to provide musical support. The decision was made to discontinue the services at this time. Pastor Tina shared that she believes that we need to make disciples for the transformation of the world. We discussed some of our weaknesses and our strengths. We need to be open to

others, have open communication and find ways to reach out.

Congregational Life Committee: Karen Rumberger, Chair, reported that Wesley UMC will be participating in the "Tyrone Christian Family Faith Day," on Saturday August 25 on E. Tenth Street. We will have a table and pass out Faith Day bags. We need 144 items to fill the bags. Anyone that may be interested in contributing items for the bags will need to give them to Karen by August 12. The committee will pack the bags in the Fellowship Hall on August 13. We also need to borrow pictures of our church activities to make a display board for Faith Day. Karen also shared that Wesley will hold its Annual Breakfast in the Park on August 19 at 9:00 am with a worship service to follow. Further details can be found on page 6.

<u>Wesley Choir:</u> Our Summer Special Music is soon coming to an end. We have been filled and are still being filled with inspirational music every worship service throughout our summer months. "Thank You" to all guests outside of our church family and especially to all of our choir members who are so willing to share their God given musical talents in praising His name through song.

Wesley Choir Begins! Our choir has experienced a major change this past year when we moved from our one and a half hour rehearsal on Wednesday evenings to a fortyfive minute rehearsal block on Sunday mornings following our worship service. Our church organist, Beth Foster who was the accompanist for our choir and no longer able to meet with us on Wednesdays, offered to practice with us on Sundays after our worship service. We were so grateful to still have our accompanist, but it was a difficult change for our choir to make with the shortened rehearsal time to prepare anthems and also the increased membership absentees due to family obligations on Sundays. We will soon begin our second year with our newly acquired rehearsal times knowing that God

has helped us through this change and He is Faithful! Thank you Beth and Choir for your commitment and faithfulness!

And Now!! Come join us! Our first rehearsal for our new year will be Sunday, August 26 at 10:45 am following the worship service. Our first performance will be September 16; high school age and up are welcome!! If you love to sing that is all you need in order to join.

<u>Children's Ministry:</u> Wesley Children and Youth Sunday took place on May 20, in our fellowship hall due to carpet installation in our sanctuary. Amy Stever was in charge of coordinating all of our kids in reading scripture, collecting offering, ushering, performing music and also performing a "skit." Thank you to Amy, our kids, and a big thank you to all our families who are placing at the top of their priorities Sunday school and church attendance.

Sight and Sound Trip: On June 12, a caravan of cars traveled to Lancaster with 36 children, youth, and adults from our church family and friends to see the show "Jesus". Our Children and Youth Ministries were excited knowing that our spaghetti fund raiser in March, along with several large donations made it possible for all of our kids to go cost free. All who went highly recommend to anyone who has not seen the show to put it on your calendar and go! It was an amazing time spent in seeing our Lord and Savior's three year ministry take life on stage.

Sunday School Fall Kick Off is coming soon! Sunday School Fall Kick Off is scheduled for September 16. It begins at 9:00 am in the fellowship hall with registration and breakfast munches. That will be followed with games, prizes and a tour through the classrooms where you will meet your teachers and finally seeing what our youth choir, The Praise JAM Singers, is all about. Check the bulletin for more information as it gets closer to the date. Hospitality Committee: Darlene Cupp, Chair, reported that she met with Pastor Tina to discuss the role of the Hospitality Committee.

They reviewed the information that is given out to first time visitors to the church and discussed changes that will be made. They also discussed home visitations.

### IN OUR SANCTUARY



Have you ever looked at the small portion of the window in the Chancel area and wondered what each of the symbols mean? For instance, what does the portion pictured above that is located above the Cross?

The following information was taken from the Consecration Service booklet, held on Sunday, March 8, 1964. The jeweled base section at the reredos is intended to represent, through colors that God's love is with us both day and night. The center small circle symbolizes Christ. The blue colors that radiate from Him represent dawn to night. Four smaller red circles symbolize that God's love extends to the four corners of the earth. Christ, represented by the red circle, the yellow and gold colors represent the Holy Spirit radiating from God, depicted by the blue glass, complete the jewel impression.

We will continue to describe the rest of the beautiful sanctuary windows in upcoming newsletters. Be sure to watch for them. If you are curious before the Sept./Oct. newsletter comes out, come to church and get a view of all the windows at once.
